About 5 or 6 years ago, at a USPTO Independent Inventors Conference, I heard a representative from P&G talk about their Open Innovation Program and it blew me away!

Why all the safeguards are in place. How you have to approach them. Why you need a patent. It all just made sense. I have been preaching about it ever since.

They have refined their system over time and Cathy brought their new program to my attention while working on the EXPO. www.pgconnectdevelop.com

However, BEFORE you submit anything you should follow the advice of the speaker I heard that changed my whole outlook on this business.

Don't waste your time with Incremental Improvements. They have more than enough of them in house. Be very careful with New Uses. Yes you can patent a new use but how can you police it. You might recall the father in my "Big Fat Greek Wedding" used Windex for everything including cuts.

Now let's say you got a patent on that new use, why would Windex license it from you. They would then have to go through all the expense to get a FDA approval. They would open themselves up to all sorts of liability and they would have to pay YOU! Why not

have some third party suggest the use in let's say a movie or in the many helpful hints sections found in most publications. Then it is up to the user to decide if they want to try that New Use.

Don't submit Ideas. As he said, 'If we like your idea, we WILL take it. Maybe even give you \$50.00 worth of coupons for it'. They tell you everywhere to protect yourself with a patent. They usually don't even consider anything unless you have an Issued Patent.

The Disclosure agreement usually states that Nothing is held in confidence and your only protection from them infringing on your invention is a US Granted Patent.

Develop the invention completely. Get it as far as you can. Don't say here is the basic concept and they can finish the job because THEY WILL and they don't need YOU or your permission to do so.

The better the presentation you make with a full business plan including marketing information with verifiable projections, the better your chance of success. Don't think that they will just fall in love with it when they see it.

The opportunity is out there but you have to follow their rules. ❖

"This doesn't need to be overly extensive - look for changes in your target market, areas that may need to be reprioritized, and ways to improve the efficiency of your operations. Every 3-5 years is when you do a more comprehensive review, and look for ways to really move the needle. Finally, review your plan after a major shift in your industry or other critical event." Fiscal Year 2011 SBIR Solicitation Opens

The U.S. Department of Education (ED) National Institute on Disability and Rehabilitation Research (NIDRR) is now accepting proposals in response to their Fiscal Year 2011 SBIR Solicitation. The application deadline is February 11, 2011. The application package is available in either MSWord or PDF file formats at www2.ed.gov/programs/nidrr/applicant.html#s1.

The Department of Education expects to make approximately 15 Phase I grant awards ranging up to \$75,000 for projects that address the needs of individuals with disabilities and their families. Activities may include: conducting manufacturing related R&D that encompasses improvements in existing methods or processes, or wholly new processes, machines, or systems; exploring the uses of technology to ensure equal access to education, employment, community environments, and information for individuals with disabilities; and improving the quality and utility of disability and rehabilitation research.

The FY 2011 solicitation also includes five invitational priorities. Under 34 CFR 75.105(c)(1) applications that meet one of these invitational priorities are not given a competitive or absolute preference over other applications.

These priorities are:

- Increased independence of individuals with disabilities in the workplace, recreational settings, or educational settings through the development of technology to support access and promote integration of individuals with disabilities
- Enhanced sensory or motor function of individuals with disabilities through the development of technology to support improved functional capacity.
- Enhanced workforce participation through the development of technology to support access to employment, promote sustained employment, and promote employment advancement for individuals with disabilities.
- Enhanced community participation and living for individuals with disabilities through the development of accessible information technology including Web access technology, software, and other systems and devices that promote access to information in educational, employment, and community settings, and voting technology that improves access for individuals with disabilities.
- Improved interventions and increased use of health-care resources through the development of technology to support independent access to health-care services in the community for individuals with disabilities.

USPTO Numbers in 2010

In 2010, the United States patent office issued some 219,614 utility patents. Of those, 5,896 were issued to IBM the global leader in patents and the first company ever to receive more than 5,000 patents in a single year. Second place was Samsung 4,551 and third Microsoft 3,094.

Half of all US patents went to American companies, demonstrating the level of international use of the United States’ patent office. Next was Japan with 21.3%, followed by South Korea 5.4%, Germany 5.2% and Taiwan 3.8%. ❖

Florida Electronic Library

The Florida Electronic Library (www.flelibrary.org) is a gateway to select Internet resources that offers access to comprehensive, accurate, and reliable information. Available resources include electronic magazines, newspapers, almanacs, encyclopedias, and books, providing information on topics such as current events, education, business, technology, and health issues.

For example, a search on business brings up a list of available databases. If you select demographics, you are prompted for your library card bar code number. (You must have a Florida library card.) Next, scroll down a list and select Demographics Now. This opens Demographics Now Library Edition which offers Geographic Business Intelligence for:

- Business & Marketing Plans — fast and easy formatted reports available in seconds!
- Determining where you should locate your business.
- Understanding your customers better — How much do they earn? How much do they spend?
- Analyzing new markets...should you expand to other areas?
- Targeting direct mail and advertising programs — to the customers most likely to buy your product/service.
- Identifying where your competitors are located.
- Great for territory sales planning!
- Lifestyle customer segmentation categorization used by the professionals.

Other available resources in the business database list include:

- Business Index ASAP (Gale) - "Late-breaking news and event coverage on companies, industries, products and executives."
- Computer Database (Gale) - Provides the most well read and influential periodicals on the computer, telecommunications, and electronics industries. In one seamless search, researchers who need to keep ace with the fast changing world of high technology can scan the latest high-tech topics through industry status reports, company profiles and more.
- General Business File ASAP - Analyze company performance and activity, industry events and trends as well as the latest in management, economics and politics. Access to a combination of broker research reports, trade publications, newspapers, journals and company directory listings with full text and images available.
- General Reference Center (Gold) - Integrates a vast array of key business and general interest titles, from national news magazines and encyclopedias, to core business journals, containing full-text and image resources and featuring more than 3,934 titles whether working from the library or remote sites."
- Small Business Resource Center - This comprehensive database covers all major areas of starting, operating and maintaining a business from financing, management, marketing, accounting, taxes and more. ❖
